### Pastor's Corner

On the twelfth day of Christmas my true love gave to me—Epiphany! We all know and adore the “Twelve Days of Christmas” song. We enjoy the challenge of trying to remember every part. Children especially enjoy singing it. This beloved song brings to mind the tradition throughout the history of the church to celebrate twelve days of Christmas, beginning with Christmas Day on December 25 and ending on the day of Epiphany, traditionally celebrated on January 6. On that day the Christmas tide flows into the season of Epiphany.

Epiphany comes from two Greek words *epi* and *phaino*. Together the two words mean “to show forth” or “appear.” In the Epiphany season the church focuses on showing forth or making known to the whole world the newborn Christ as “God in the flesh.” Epiphany uncovers who Jesus is and so forms the foundation for understanding what he has done for us, the focus of the Lent and Easter seasons.

Four events from Jesus' life are highlighted through the readings during Epiphany: the visit of the Magi to Jesus sometime after his birth (Mt 2:1-12), the baptism of Jesus (Mt 3:13-17; Mk 1:4-11; Lk 3:15-17, 21-22), the miracle of changing water into wine at the wedding of Cana (Jn 2:1-11), and the transfiguration of our Lord (Mt 17:1-9; Mk 9:2-9; Lk 9:28-36). The theme of “making Christ known to all nations” is found in the account of the Magi and continues to show itself in the other readings during the Epiphany season.

The theme of “making Christ known to all nations” comes to our doorstep as members of the church. We are invited not only to recall the truth that Jesus died and rose for the whole world but to act on it by witnessing to all people, including those across the street, in our family, in the same aisle of the grocery store, and in the cubicle next to us. We can take seriously this Epiphany theme of “making Christ known” by focusing on Jesus’ way of witnessing. In his book, *Speaking of Jesus: Finding the Words for Witness* (Fortress Press, 1982), Richard Lischer highlights five ways that Jesus himself spoke the gospel to others. We can use these five ways as an example when applying the theme of Epiphany to our lives. We can also use these five ways as a mirror in which we see how we have often failed to “give a reason for the hope we have in Christ” (1 Pet 3:15). In this way we can be positioned to turn to the foot of the cross and receive God’s forgiveness in Christ. Jesus’ five modes of communicating the gospel, according to Lischer, are paraphrased as follows:

**Dialogic:** He was an active listener and used the questions of the other person as a way to understand that person and probe that person’s heart (cf. Mk 10:17-18).

**Holistic:** Jesus was concerned for the whole person—body and soul. He forgave the sick and healed the sinners. And so we are called to forgive others (Mt 18), continuing the ministry of reconciliation (2 Cor 5:10-19).

**Situational:** Jesus was “on location.” He went to where the people were—the bank, the city park, the local store, the neighborhood—and reached out to them in their life situations (Mt 4:18-25; Lk 19:1-10). He didn’t wait for them to come to church. And so we can bring the gospel of all healing, peace, and comfort to people.

**Simple Language:** Jesus communicated in simple language and often spoke in parables employing common, everyday objects from the life and work of the people to make his points (Mt 13; Jn 7:37-39).

**Decisive:** Jesus moved people to repentance (Mk 1:15). We often hear the saying, “Jesus loves you just the way you are.” This is true. However, he also has no plans of leaving us “the way we are.” This is how much he loves us.

I pray that all of you have a blessed Epiphany season. Celebrate it through study and devotions; worship and participation in the Holy Sacraments. Though, in the middle of all of these celebrations I pray that we also “become all things to all men” (1 Cor 9:22) as we make Jesus known to our family members, our friends, neighbors, and our coworkers. May we join the shepherds on that first Christmas to glorify and praise God for all the things we have heard and seen (Lk 2:20).

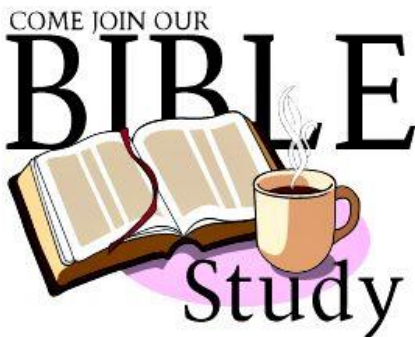

## **LEARN ABOUT ZION** by Peggy Brooke

---

For the last few months, I have been working on the history of Zion Lutheran Church. While going through some records I found a narrative that Pastor James Haugen gave during our celebration in 2006. In the next few months, I will continue to show the generations of Zion. There are four parts, so I am going to put one in the Zealant each month. You can see the pictures of some of these early ministers in the library right inside the door.

I also just heard that the Baptist Church who owns the original Zion on Ellsworth was sold in 2022.

### **1846-1886 THE FIRST GENERATION**

---

In the 1840's Columbia City was known as Columbia. Early Missionary Pioneer, Fredrick Wyneken, had Columbia on his regular list. This led the way to students preaching at the county seat of Whitley County. Rev J.K.D Loche writes of the adventures of one of the students, George Strecafus, who was in Whitley County in August of 1846. Dr. Shiler sent him to Whitley County where he visited two German settlements. At that time, the fever was raging so violently that it struck six or seven people in one house and sixteen in another. He gave Christian burial to four German women, two of which had arrived from Germany four weeks earlier. He baptized several children, only to watch them approach death. It seems the blessing of his presence was important there. Strecafus, himself, came down with fever. He lay in bed eleven days at Columbia, and three days in the wilderness. Strecafus and the other students worked hard and suffered much to serve Jesus.

During the first generation, the Civil War played an enormous role. In 1861 the seminary was moved to St Louis to keep the operation going. This was to keep the seminarians from getting drafted. This also made it necessary to call a pastor, which was Rev. Gotthiff Chr. Reichardt. He moved to Columbia City and began to serve on June 16, 1861. He was a pastor also of our sister congregation St. John's on the Eel River. This lengthy tenure was the only time that the congregation shared a pastor. St John's is the daughter of St Peters in Huntington and Zion is a daughter of St Paul's in Fort Wayne. Rev. Reichardt was born in Beurdus Saxony, Germany, December 28, 1822, and came to New York in June of 1845.

He was university trained and an excellent musician. He played the violin, which he often did for services. Under his leadership, the Ellsworth Street building was constructed in 1866. The Columbia Newspaper stated that on Nov 21, 1866, "The members of the German Lutheran Church have completed a very fine church building and will dedicate it on next Sunday. All denominations are cordially invited to be present on this occasion." The building still stands, perhaps one of the oldest in the community. Rev. Stephen Hassold was installed as Pastor on July 9, 1876, He then accepted a call to St. Peters, Huntington Indiana on April 15, 1879. Likewise, Rev. John Zimmerman served from November 14, 1880 until October 1, 1882. Rev. Traugoff Thieme served from June 28, 1883 until January 2, 1889. These individuals were the pastors of the first generation.

We are aware of some of the family names from the first generation. August Erdman was co-owner of the brickyard and worked on construction for many downtown buildings. He also was a representative at the church conventions. Other names noted: Auer, Bruegman, Clogston, Ditmer, Fenker, Gahl, Kerch, Shapper, Trier, and Wieck. This is just a partial list: there is much research that could be done.
